DID YOU KNOW? Reading to your child can open so many doors! Through books we can learn about the real world or escape to imaginary places. Knowing how to read allows us to follow a recipe, look up a phone numbers, understand how to assemble things, and so much more! Naturally, we want our child to learn to read! There are several important things you can do even when your children are infants and toddlers.

## **Build a home library**

Research has shown that children who grow up in a home where there are many books are more successful in school and stay in school longer .You can often buy great books for children and for yourself at yard sales or library sales for

low prices. Choose durable books for infants and toddlers, such as sturdy board books or cloth books. Your child will enjoy books with bright colorful pictures, and just a few words. Some children are attracted to realistic photos and others like illustrations. Your little ones need to know reading is for everyone.

# **Read Often Aloud**

Bedtime is a good time to read to your child, but not the only time. If your child does not seem interested in a book, try just talking about the pictures rather than reading word for word. Using lots of expression and even silly voices adds to the fun. Keep reading time fun and relaxing and you're likely to find that it becomes a favorite

activity for you and your child.

# **Model Reading**

Children watch their parents and learn by what they see. Whether you are reading a recipe card or your favorite book, let your child see that you value and enjoy reading. When your child ask a question you can't answer, let your child se e you look in a book to find the information.

There is peace of mind that comes from knowing what you and your family can do to prevent or escape a house fire




during an emergency. Protect what matters to you most by being aware of these home fire preparation and prevention tips.
